

In Maths, the children in Squirrels and Hedgehogs have been learning about number bonds to 10. They have been looking at how to represent these number bonds on a partwhole model.



Y1

This week in Year 1 the children have been focusing on making their writing more interesting by using adjectives to describe settings.

In Maths they have been exploring number lines up to 50.


In PSHE, the children have been thinking about what their bodies can do and how they use them in everyday activities.

In History they have been continuing to find out about the life of Queen Elizabeth II, and how they can find out information about her from exploring royal portraits.

In Science, the children have looked at how plants grow, using the vocabulary seeds, roots, shoots and leaves.







This week, Owls and Foxes have started learning a new story in English -The True Story of The Three Little Pigs. This is the wolf's version of the story where he claims he is innocent, and he blew the pigs' houses down by accident when he had a terrible sneezing cold.


In Maths the children have been continuing our work on multiplication and division and thinking about fact families

In History, the children have started their new topic about King Richard III and have been learning key facts about him: when he was born, when he was crowned, the war that was happening between the Houses of York and Lancaster and what happened to him. The children and staff are very excited about the trip next week to find out more about him!

In Science, they have begun a new topic about animals and their offspring. This week the children have considered the question "Do all offspring look like their parents?" We discovered that many animals look like their parents but some, such as tadpoles and newts, have to go through many changes.


